<u>CALL TO ORDER</u> – Chairman Pitts called the meeting to order at 5:30 P.M. and invited all to stand for the invocation provided by Vice Chairman Wood.

<u>PLEDGE OF ALLEGIANCE</u> – The Pledge of Allegiance was lead by Mr. Richard Edward Willingham – First Lieutenant, U.S. Army.

Chairman Pitts recognized Mr. Willingham by offering the following military activity: Drafted in 1945 and served in Korea until discharged in 1946 and achieving the rank of Sergeant. After his release of active Army, Sergeant Willingham enlisted in the US Army Reserves and also found time for college at Erskine and Presbyterian Colleges. Sergeant Willingham served in the US Army Reserves from 1946 to 1950 and was recalled to active duty in the regular Army in 1950. Attended Officer Candidate School where he was commissioned as a Second Lieutenant and had multiple assignments – Fort Benning, Georgia, Fort Polk,

Louisiana and Fort Riley, Kansas. He was released from active duty in 1954 achieving the rank of First Lieutenant. He returned home and enlisted in the South Carolina National Guard where he remained until 1960. For his faithful service, he was awarded the following citations: World War II Victory Medal. Army of Occupation Medal (Lapas) and the Army Good Conduct Medal.

<u>PUBLIC HEARING ORDINANCE #867 FISCAL YEAR 2019/2020 - LOCAL OPTION SALES TAX</u> Chairman Pitts opened the Public Hearing at 5:49 P.M. Having no one wishing to speak, Chairman Pitts closed the Public Hearing at 5:50 P.M.

THIRD ORDINANCE #867 FISCAL YEAR 2019/2020 - LOCAL OPTION SALES TAX COUNCILWOMAN ANDERSON made the MOTION to approve with COUNCILMAN MCDANIEL SECONDING for discussion.

Chairman Pitts said, "This Council directs and authorizes the reallocation of an amount up to one hundred percent (100%) of the total twenty nine percent (29%) of the Local Option Sales and Use Tax, less any reserves as may be deemed proper, for allocation and application to the General Fund Revenues to balance the revenue shortfall as determined by the 2019/2020 Laurens County Budget Ordinance #865. This Council also states to apply the maximum credits as set forth by law for the taxpayers of Laurens County. This Council also requires the administrative staff to review the fiscal year 2019 closeout numbers and determine the portion of the twenty nine percent (29%), if any, may be needed to be secure a financial base – to be presented to Council on or before September 30, 2019". I want this to be clear that it states may not shall"

VOTE 5-1 (Vice Chairman Wood in opposition).

<u>AWARD TRANSFER STATION</u> – Mr. Dale Satterfield approached Council saying that since he was on vacation last week, Mr. Wilson will be presenting the details to night.

Mr. Wilson said, "At the last meeting Councilman Wood brought up some valuable questions about this project. Again, we sent out bid packages to several vendors and advertised for this project. We held a pre-bid conference and we received three (3) bids from vendors. All were given the same bid package so they would be bidding on the same specs. The Solid Waste Capital Fund will be the funding source with an amount to not exceed \$1,375,500. This is a three sided design build. Therading e biggest thing right now is going to be what is under the soil. The compaction tests proved to be okay. We are looking at one hundred twenty days for design, permitting and the actual grading".

Vice Chairman Wood noted under Design Excludes, New Convenience Center Design; that is a design of a new convenience center. Mr. Wilson replied that we already have a convenience center, this is for a transfer station.

Mr. Chris Gurga said, "The convenience center build, I designed it and am in the process of building it inhouse. The only costs associated would be about a four hundred foot chain link fence. We are moving to an existing cement pad. It is becoming an almost impossible task of transporting trash to Twin Chimneys. We are running behind due to time restraints and are having breakdowns of the trucks".

Chairman Pitts asked about the Chapter 17 Inspections? Several were puzzled with what Chapter 17 Inspections were.

Councilman McDaniel asked if using our own field dirt would help keep the costs down. Mr. Wilson stated that it was possible and that they were working now with the five thousand cubic yard levels and that they had entertained helping move the dirt. Chairman Pitts stated that no matter how many trucks haul in the dirt, the compaction of it is of concern. Mr. Wilson said that a third party would be on site for this.

Vice Chairman Wood said, "I can understand the haste of wanting to build this. If it is not written in the contract, they are not obligated to put it in. What we have been presented here is a basic concept of what we need. This is going to have to last us many years and will have to handle a lot of trucks that are thirty to forty tons each. They will be backing into this structure. In my opinion, having been in construction of sorts all of my life, this is not ready to be bid out. This is concept drawings when it is supposed to be a design build. There are no structural drawings with what we have received. There are things noted in the exclusions that this County is going to have to pay for. Compaction was also noted earlier. It says in the exclusions, any and all testing. There are no structural designs with the bid - again only a concept. With this bid, the County is at the mercy of the contractor on building what they want, not what the County needs. The Office in the plan is at the rear of the building on a lower level. The office should be on the side or the front where the trucks come in so it can be monitored. Earth work, excavation and grading, it says eight foot; on the drawings it says the tunnel is going to be fifteen foot meaning that the tipping floor is going to be fifteen foot off of the ground but it show estimating a build of eight feet. If they are figuring five thousand yards of dirt, it may be half of that needed. Anything over five thousand yards, you are going to pay extra for. All it says is a pre-engineered building with no drawings or specifications; no structural design. There are no specs on the concrete strengths; the electrical is only a basic; shows no lights or wiring; the unit will require wash downs that consists of contaminants - no drains or containment areas; no fire suppression noted; fire hoses will be needed; no restrooms noted; no ventilation plans; no heating and air plans; no note of rebar for the main areas; no retaining walls. It will look good for four or five months but will really look like its twenty years old. I circled several areas that said see structural drawings – there are no structural drawings. We are at the mercy of this contractor where they are going to put whatever in there. I suggest hiring a structural engineer for design with specifications".

Administrator Caime said, "There are a couple of ways to build things. One is to hire an architect engineer and another is to design build. All of the things noted are in the design on a design build with a contractor".

Councilman Younts asked if we had a structural engineer to oversee all of this, would that solve the problems? Administrator Caime said, "Builders are not designers. We can get an engineer to help us through this".

Chairman Pitts asked where do we go from here, as I do see we do need more information and guidance because it is a facility that should be built to last fifty years or more. Administrator Caime thanked Council and said that the staff would line up the engineer.

<u>ADDED AGENDA ITEM - 800 MGHZ RADIOS - FIRE AND EMERGENCY PERSONNEL - Mr. Avery,</u> Director of Communications said, "This came to us as a result of a recent Emergency Services meeting where communication issues were identified with ZF Transmissions. I came up with the need for ten radios for Fire at a cost of twenty four thousand six hundred dollars (\$24,600). Administrator Caime indicated that there were funds in a contingency account that could be used for this purchase".

COUNCILMAN CARROLL made the MOTION to approve for the purchase with funding being the contingency account. COUNCILMAN YOUNTS SECONDING for discussion. Administrator Caime stated that since it was for the Fire Department that there was money in the Fire Special Purpose Fund to use for purchasing.

COUNCILWOMAN ANDERSON asked to AMEND THE MOTION to use the fund from the Fire Special Purpose Fund monies. COUNCILMAN MCDANIEL SECONDING; VOTE 6-0.

ADDED AGENDA ITEM – REPORT FROM THE COUNTY COUNCIL COMMITTEE ON HEALTH, WELFARE AND PUBLIC SAFETY – Committee Chairman McDaniel said, "As a MOTION and a SECOND FROM THE COMMITTEE, we recommend Council action towards out of county transports as changing the current policy to say that in the absence of a true medical emergency, for the Laurens County EMS transports to take to the closest, appropriate hospital".

Chairman Pitts asked for comments from Council. Councilman Carroll said, "If all of the resources are in the County, then any request to go to a specific hospital is honored. If one has a small hand laceration, that an urgent care facility could attend to, it makes no sense to take this matter forty miles out of county and reducing in county resources. This would allow the EMS provider to assess the situation and to determine where the patient could be treated. If a patient was adamant to go to a certain hospital, then an assessment could be made by the EMS staff and their supervisor".

OLD BUSINESS:

PUBLIC COMMENT:

Mr. Alan Rykard from the Princeton Community, spoke of the increase of "Gang Activity" and asked for Council to support and increase the funding for the Sheriffs Department so they could do their jobs in curtailing the gangs.

COUNTY COUNCIL COMMENTS:

Chairman Pitts reminded Council of the planned called meeting of Council for Thursday at 5:30 P.M. for budget matters and the Employee Appreciation Cookout on Friday.

Councilman Carroll noted that he was happy with the discussions being made and allowing for better service.

EXECUTIVE SESSION - COUNCILMAN CARROLL made the MOTION to move into Executive Session at 6:46 P.M. to discuss a legal matter concerning the Historic Courthouse. COUNCILWOMAN ANDERSON SECONDING; VOTE 6-0.

Council returned to open session at 7:10 P.M.

MINUTES – JULY 25, 2019 LAURENS COUNTY COUNCIL

COUNCILMAN MCDANIEL made the MOTION to allow up to sixty five thousand dollars (\$65,000) from the contingency account to be used to correct the situation at the Historic Courthouse with COUNCILWOMAN ANDERSON SECONDING; VOTE 6-0.
