GIVE A BRIEF STATEMENT OF NEED FOR AMERICAN RESCUE PLAN ACT (ARPA) FUNDS.

The University of South Carolina Union Laurens Location is requesting ARPA funds to be used specifically for the benefit of the citizens of Laurens County. These funds would be earmarked for the installation of a virtual reality science lab classroom that would offer in person laboratory courses. By having designated funding exclusively for this purpose, this project could be implemented fairly quickly, which would directly enhance educational opportunities offered at the Laurens campus. Prior COVID related funding has been focused on expanding and improving remote instruction. This ARPA funding would focus on enhancing in person opportunities and allow the Laurens campus to provide in person lab courses, which it has not previously been able to do. This would alleviate travel between Laurens and Union for those students who want to enroll for in person lab courses or have limited resources for commuting. The new lab space courses could be used for traditional college courses as well as courses offered through the University's high school dual credit program. By also incorporating state of the art virtual reality (VR) technology, the lab could increase course options in anatomy and physiology, which would benefit those students pursuing science and nursing degrees. The VR technology was recently implemented at the Union Campus through a grant from a local corporate donation. Being able to also provide these types of educational opportunities in Laurens would be a great benefit to the students of Laurens County and build upon the programs offered at the Laurens location of the University of South Carolina Union.

SECTION III: ORGANIZATIONAL PROFILE AND PROJECT DESCRIPTION

1. Briefly state the history and purpose of your organization.

The Union regional Palmetto College campus, is a branch campus of the University of South Carolina Columbia. Union has as its mission to provide higher education and intellectual leadership for its service area. At the heart of this mission is a teaching faculty of high quality dedicated to excellence in instruction, scholarship, public and professional service, and creative endeavor which enrich the classroom experience. UofSC Union offers a varied curriculum grounded in the liberal arts and focused on preparing students to continue their education in the University and throughout life. UofSC Union was established to encourage higher education in the counties of Chester, Cherokee, Fairfield, Laurens, Union, and York. The original design of the institution incorporated a flexibility that has allowed changes in institutional capability with increasing educational demands of constituents. Through classroom and laboratory instruction delivered in a variety of face-to-face and distance learning formats and modalities, the institution awards the Associate in Arts and Associate in Science degrees and provides for the completion of selected bachelor's degrees on campus through cooperative agreements and delivery structures with other University of South Carolina System institutions. UofSC Union also provides general education and upper division coursework applicable to baccalaureate degree programs offered through colleges and universities nationwide.

2. Describe in detail how the pandemic has affected your organization.

When the pandemic hit in 2020, the University was most definitely caught off guard as were most higher education institutions across the United States. The days were long and difficult, and the process to continue providing all educational services was unknown. However, with swift planning and a network of resources, the Union and Laurens campuses (along with the entire UofSC system) were able to pivot quickly and develop instructional strategies to get through the toughest times of the pandemic. The campuses were fortunate to have a solid remote learning infrastructure in place as a basis to move students to online learning without delays. To enhance remote learning resources, state and federal COVID funding was utilized, which was crucial to the continuation of operations. The campuses were also presented with the task and expense of ensuring that a healthy and safe environment awaited students once they returned to in person instruction. Again, through the use of the federal and state COVID funding, PPE, additional cleaning and sanitation services, training, and general COVID mitigation initiatives were put into place. Student enrollments throughout the pandemic have remained steady and have increased in some areas. The faculty and staff have been resilient in adapting as necessary, and have been a catalyst for ensuring that students had and continue to have the full services offered by a university. While USC Union and the USC Union at Laurens location are emerging from the pandemic in a positive position, there is still so much more that can be done. Allocating funding to expand science lab space for the Laurens student population, would greatly enhance educational opportunities for the citizens of Laurens county.

3. How will any funding awarded be utilized?

These funds will be used to create a Virtual Reality (VR) science lab at the Laurens location. The lab would consist of 18 computer stations with 2 setup for VR and 16 standard desktops. This type of lab was established on the Union Campus several years ago, but adding another lab of this type to the Laurens location would allow the citizens of Laurens to take these lab science courses locally, without the need to travel to Union. By offering these lab science courses locally, the campus would alleviate one hurdle in expanding general education offerings as as well as moving towards nursing courses in the future. VR labs are an excellent resource and opportunity, not only because of the cutting edge technology, but also because of the cost and flexibility. VR labs are easily setup and moved if needed. They cost a fraction of a traditional lab space and many college and universities are moving toward this type of technology. The ability to offer both in person classes as well as state of the art technology is an excellent opportunity for Laurens students to learn while they stay connected locally.

4. State your organization's ability to continue operations (i.e. current staffing levels, staff qualifications, prior experience, etc.)

USC Union began operations in 1965 and has continually tried to improve and expand its services year after year. The institution maintains a sound financial position and strives to ensure that funding resources are allocated strategically to provide the most benefits to its students. Faculty and staff are highly qualified, capable, and productive. The turnover rate for employees is very low on the campuses, so there is a wealth of knowledge, education, and experience within the organization. USC Union and USC Union Laurens Location also have the resources and knowledge base of the main campus of the University of South Carolina, along with the support of the local Union and Laurens communities, the Union/Laurens Commission for Higher Education, and the USC Union Partnership Board.

5. Discuss your organization's relationship with other programs in the community designed to meet the same or similar needs, especially those that provide services/assistance to those most impacted by the pandemic. Describe collaborative partnerships that may result.

The University of South Carolina Union - Laurens Location has established long-term relationships with the Laurens County Community. The University currently offers dual enrollment courses in partnership with Laurens District 55 and District 56 Highs schools, as well as Laurens Academy. The campus is active in other community organizations such as the Laurens Chamber of Commerce, Leadership Laurens County, Laurens Future Scholarship Committee, Main St. Laurens, Rotary Club of Laurens, SBDC Advisory Committee and participates in a variety of other community fundraisers. This lab will allow the campus to further partner with local schools by expanding dual enrollment courses, as well as offering science lab courses that have not been possible to offer in the past. Traditional and adult students would also have the opportunity to have these specialized courses locally, as some cannot travel at traditional class times or are uncomfortable enrolling in these courses online. The long term goal is to be able to expand offerings for nursing courses which could lead to a partnership with local area hospitals and medical facilities.

For this project, the University is requesting \$75,000 from the ARPA grant. The campus would also be contributing \$15,000 from its genreal operating budget towards this project. Additionally, USC Union and the USC Union Laurens location would provide for any recurring costs associated with the project. General operating funds and/or tuition fee revenue would be used for the University's share of the project as well as any future recurring costs. The addition of this lab should increase enrollment in courses offered at the Laurens Location, which in turn would result in additional tuition and fee revenue which could be reinvested into programs and services in the Laurens area.


